
## My Mission in Okinawa







## **Preface**

I became interested in people from Okinawa as much as Okinawa prefecture when, after the end of the second world war, Japanese people living in Canada were released from concentration camps and began to move all over Canada. Four thousand compatriots crossed the Rocky Mountains to a farm on a wide plain in the southern part of Alberta for getting work.

As the only Nikkei pastor of the Anglican Church at the time in Canada, I was ordered to enlighten the four thousand compatriots, and on 31<sup>st</sup> August 1945, I moved with my family to a small rural town called Coaldale in Alberta. There were no churches and only three families as believers. However, since before the second world war, there were around three hundred compatriots from Okinawa, who seemed energetic with a healthy complexion and bright eyes, in Alberta. First I was surprised that, in this area where there was less anti–Japanese sentiment, they were not in much aftermath of the war and active with trust from Caucasians. I wonder if it was thanks to their foresight or God's consideration. Since people from Okinawa, whom I became close to as the days go by, were so kind, affectionate and respectable, I came to respect them as much as Okinawa prefecture in a friendly way.
