

In this month's Bulletin, you will read a statement by Joy Kogawa and her brother Timothy. This article is intended to provide background information about the involvement of the GVJCCA's Human Rights committee. In 2006, Leslie Komori with Joy Kogawa's agreement arranged a meeting with GVJCCA Human Rights Committee and some community members who were upset about Joy's father, Reverend Gordon Goichi Nakayama, being an alleged pedophile. Some members asked her to go public. Joy agreed it was the right thing to do and wanted healing for her father's victims.

At a meeting with Anglican Church on February 12th of this year, it was mutually agreed that the first order of business would be to establish a timeline of Rev. Nakayama's postings. This was crucial in order to ascertain his activities in the years and areas to which he was posted. Once this timeline is established, it would enable us to find potential victims who may have lived in the region during that time period. We are hoping that we can have this information by the end of March

of this year. Further action will be formulated upon completion of the timeline.

Concurrently, Joy's brother Timothy also felt that it was time to come forward to acknowledge their father's transgressions and apologize to the many victims affected. They will be issuing a joint statement in The Bulletin and The Nikkei Voice.

Our objective is to seek truth and reconciliation for the many victims and relatives of those who have passed away. Our committee thanks Joy for her openness and courage.
